- phrases for organising ideas


Main task

Pronunciation

All the modals are contracted.

The last sound of each modal links to the contracted form of have e.g. could have = kə dəv

May have, however, insert a /j/ sound which then links across.

In sentence 4 and 5 the speaker is certain. The speaker uses must have and can't have – we assume this is based on evidence.

Pronunciation

Speaking - Set up

- **a.** Tell students they're going to review a business project about a product called 'myGlasses.' Students work in groups to speculate what the product could be (e.g. its functions, who would buy it, etc.)
- **b.** Give groups a copy of the description of 'myGlasses (Dec 2013)'. Students see if their guesses about the product were correct. Students discuss potential problems the product/project could have.
- **c.** Give students a copy of the graph 'myGlasses UK Profits 2014.' Students speculate about what could have happened/reasons for the product's failure.
- **d.** Give students a copy of 'A message from the chairperson' and 'Excerpt from a local newspaper.' Students see if their speculations were correct.
- **e.** Now students understand the context of the project, they are ready to start their meeting. Each group assigns one person as chairperson. Students follow the meeting agenda in the student handout.
