- 4. What are some of the things that happened during World War 2?
- 5. Did your country have any involvement in World War 2?
- 6. Which other wars has your country been involved in?
- 7. Do you think there could be another world war in the future? If so, what might cause this?
- 8. Have we forgotten the lessons of history with respect to war and conflict?



2. Remembrance Day / Veterans Day Vocabulary

- **armistice** (noun) an agreement between opposing sides in a war to stop fighting while an attempt is made to negotiate a lasting peace; the original day to commemorate the end of World War 1 was called 'Armistice Day'.
- **trench warfare** (noun) where two opposing sides in a war dig trenches into the ground from which they attack or defend, often resulting in multiple fatalities to advance a few metres.
- **(to) conscript** (verb, noun person), **conscription** (noun concept) *compulsory enlistment of people for military service; a person who has been conscripted.*
- **poppy** (noun) a red flower; the symbol of Remembrance Day for many countries around the world who sometimes call the day 'Poppy Day'.
- **veteran** (noun) a person with many years of experience in a particular field or job; someone who served in the military.
- **lest we forget** (saying) used to remind people not to forget something; a plea not to forget the sacrifices of those who gave their lives during the wars of the past.
